
### Susan Stephenson Hefte and Emily Villiams To Co-Chair Fla. V & R

We are delighted to announce that Susan Stephenson Hefte, of the UU United Fellowship of Seminole, and Emily Williams, of the St. Petersburg Church, will begin July 1 as new Co-chairs of the Florida District Women & Religion Committee, pending formal appointment by the Fla. District President upon consultation with the District Board.

Susan has been a UU since the mid '60's and has been an active leader in religious education for 14 years, facilitating worship, ritual, on-going groups, workshops, training, Board process, two W&R retreats at the Pines, and the meditation portion of the Ingathering at the UU Women's Federation Biennial last year in Ft. Lauderdale. She is a UUWF Circuit Rider and is on the Pines Board.

Emily has been a UU for about ten years: For the past five she has facilitated the St. Pete women's group that is now on its second round of the Cakes curriculum; and she is taking it into the larger St. Pete community by offering it at Brigit Books, a feminist bookstore. In her downtown church, she manages the bookstore, teaches the preschool class and is developing a curriculum for 3-5 year olds.

## Diana Fraser, Eleanor Goldbloom, and Esther Nighbert Win 1st W&R Awards

The Florida District Women and Religion Committee congratulates Diana Fraser, Eleanor Goldbloom, and Esther Nighbert--winners of the first Women and Religion-sponsored awards. The winners were announced at the Florida District Annual Meeting in Orlando on April 25.



Diana Fraser was present at the meeting to receive the Olympia Brown Award for taking a public stand and organizing public effort to help achieve a non-sexist society, even at the expense of risk to her own personal well-being.

Diana is a member of the UU United Fellowship of St. Petersburg and former Chair of the Women and Religion Committee. She is known for standing up for her beliefs, including marching for abortion rights and speaking out in her congregation and community against sexist language in writing and speech.

In accepting her award,
Diana expressed thanks to the
Florida District for both
financial and spiritual support
to the Women and Religion
Committee, and especially to
Mary Louise DeWolf-Hurt for
encouraging her to become active
in Women and Religion.

Eleanor Goldbloom, a member of the UU Church of Fort Myers, is the first recipient of the Charlotte Perkins Gillman Award for using a position of leadership to blaze the trail of empowering others by articulating and modeling in her own life the value of "power with," not "power-over."

Eleanor is a retired physician who learned about contraception while working as a medical student with Margaret Sanger, the founder of Planned Parenthood. Now 82, Eleanor remembers that Sanger's life's work was devoted to giving women control. She has continued to keep this work alive, first through her work as an OB-GYN physician and still through her active contributions to NOW and the Women's Political Caucus of Lee County.

Eleanor's minister,
William Miller, accepted her
award for her, describing her as
a lifelong UU who has recently
joined the church. In his
enthusiastic praise for her, he
stressed her especially
remarkable achievement in
bringing Planned Parenthood to
Lee County.



Esther Nighbert is the first recipient of the Eleanor Gordon Award for working over a period of years to foster and invigorate the principles of liberal religion. She is a dedicated 80 year old UU, who has served for many years on the Gainesville Fellowship's Social Concerns Committee. She volunteers at an elementary after-school enrichment program for low-income children, where she uses the techniques she wrote about years ago in a book on creative dramatics when she was a teacher in Washington. D.C.

Esther is an activist for peace and justice. She is on the National Board of Infact, a group that boycotts corporations it considers immoral. She has worked for justice in Nicaragua and El Salvador and has participated in "Guerilla Theater." Whether speaking up during Sunday services to urge action or sitting all day at a table collecting signatures, Esther is always living out her dedication to UU principles.

Amy Jo Smith accepted the award for Esther and read Esther's message: "In searching for words to express my thanks for the honor you have paid me, I can only say that in today's world Unitarian-Universalist values are constantly in jeopardy. For me, political and social action captures my imagination giving me a sense of hope when all seems hopeless."

The first weekend in May found seven women sharing Barbara Child's cabin on the Santa Fe River. We opened with a circle expressing what each of us wanted from the weekend, both for ourselves and the group, and then we created a safe space for opening up our lives and hearts to each other.

Through silent reflection, drawing, and, most of
all, writing, we each explored
various events in our lives
beginning with childhood and
ending up in the present and
future. Much of the time was
spent in silence.

As the group gathered together again, we each took turns reading our stories aloud. There was no critique of style or technique. Just six pairs of eyes and ears to watch and listen, and six hearts and minds sharing the tales of our lives.

Every woman touched every other woman with her story. And at the end of the weekend we realized we had created something very personal and special together, and have set a tentative time period for our next chapters to be written. Like any interruption in the middle of a good book, I am eagerly awaiting the next opportunity to listen to my friends' stories. And the river and the cypress are joyously awaiting our return.





## Introducing Miami Co-Rep Dorothy Menadier



Diana Fraser coordinated Women's Herstory Month for the UU United Fellowship of Seminole. A highlight was Karen Frank's portrayal of Susan B. Anthony and Carol Sievert's of Clara Barton.

A special event was Carolyn Taylor's workshop on "Goddesses and Wild Women" at the U. of So. Fla. Over 100 women attended. It was a goodbye gift from Carolyn to our area and an introduction to a new kind of spirituality to many women.

Emily Williams of the St. Pete church is leading 25 women through their "first slice" of Cakes for the Queen of Heaven. Some are having their "second slice" by repeating the sessions. Emily will offer a Cakes class beginning June 5 at Brigit Books in St. Pete for women who might not feel comfortable with any church.

The group pilot-testing the curriculum "Rise Up and Call Her Name" continues in Seminole, with emphasis on African and African-American women. We have prepared to make a quilt, looked at Afro-Centrism, examined prejudices and myths, and had a charged discussion on the racial crisis facing America today.



# Nancy Young Gives Workshop on Feminist Spirituality at Florida District Annual Meeting

Nancy began by reading some poems from Cries of the Spirit, edited by Marilyn Sewell, choosing especially poems from the section called "Sacredness of the Ordinary," including some of Nancy's favorite poems by Denise Levertov. She sang Lynn Wadley's beautiful song, "Ordinary Days," followed by a guided meditation, some writing, drumming, and talking about why the goddesses have become important to many women. She concluded by reading her own poem, "Contemporary Witch."

When a participant asked Nancy about her definition of spirituality, she recalled Margot Adler's words and said it is the "deep, juicy joy that one feels!" Blessed be.


## Activists Take Note!


