# Open Letter about the Area Reps' Meeting Jan. 8 & 9 --

## --from Susan Stephenson

On a very rainy night we gathered at The Pines. Our formal meeting was not until the next day but we were glad for the time to get to know each other before getting to work. Susan offered a series of questions that were represented by symbols or drawing by each of the women about her own life personally and we shared our insights with each other.

The format is one you might like to try for yourself or in relation to our local organizations. Step One, Represent where your energy has been in the past year, perhaps showing the ups and downs of it or otherwise symbolizing how your year might look. Step Two, Where would you like your energy to go in the coming year? Represent how it might take form or feel to you. Step Three, What blocks or barriers interfere with your creating what you want? (It is important here to look within.) Step Four, Ask those blocks/barriers, "What do you need to be removed?" Look over vour four drawings and notice what you have learned from this process. Complete the sentence, "I learned..." or "I discovered..." or "I reaffirm..." I'd love to hear about your insights if you give this process a try.

The following morning after a small greeting ritual we jumped right into the work at hand. First came updates on a number of exciting topics...

The Women and Religion Conference in Jacksonville was first with discussion of the considerable work that Carol Vogel and her team have been doing for many months. The big news was that Cynthia Grant Tucker, author of *Prophetic Sisterhood*, will be the

headline speaker. More on this appears elsewhere in this newsletter: be sure to check it out and get your registration in early. Yea, Jacksonville Women, one and all. We look forward to being with you in March.

Pam Leavy gave us the scoop on the Creative Arts Edition of Womanspirit. What we hope is that the church or fellowship that sponsors the Spring Conference in 1994 will develop the theme of creativity and that the results of that weekend will become the core of the publication. If your congregation is interested in sponsoring the '94 Spring Conference, let us know or come to the Area Reps' meeting at the Jacksonville Conference.

Amy Jo Smith told us about the UU Women's Caucus, which she helped to found. Its purpose is to bring feminist consciousness to the functioning of the UUA and its member congregations. Membership is open and has a fine packet of information as an extra bonus.

Nan Brooks has agreed to facilitate the Summer Retreat at The Pines. She has published a book on ritual making for women called *Ceremonies for Our Lives* and will be taking us through a process of creation in June.

In October, our own Marjorie Arnoldi and friends will be focusing on another creative theme. See her "teaser" workshop at the Spring Conference.

The entire day's work was completely by consensus (no votes taken all day). We hope we can spread our feelings of community and empowerment over the district as more of you become active in your local groups as well as our district weekends. See you in Jacksonville!

# Women & Religion Gathering in Boston

Susan and I attended the W & R Gathering in Boston Oct. 30—Nov. 1. W & R facilitators came from all over the country for community building. We stayed at the UUA "inn": Pickett & Eliot Houses, the two restored row houses on Beacon Hill adjoining UUA headquarters.

Just being with these women was empowering. I kept thinking what it would be like if all this wonderful energy (gynergy) and social consciousness and feminist focus were permanently in one place! It would be something to behold!

Barbara Child, who is now a member of the Continental W & R Committee, presented a thought-providing workshop on Conflict Management based on her recent attendance at the Alban Institute training program. Barbara is a member of the Fla. UU Conflict Management Team and did us proud.

Amy Jo Smith was also in Boston for a meeting of the UU Women's Caucus, of which she is a founding member. She updated us on the powerful work and staggering task of the Caucus as they move into official status within the UUA. All UU women benefit from the efforts that Amy Jo and the other Caucus members put into the work of transforming our religious institutions. Amy Jo is another Florida UU woman who makes you feel proud.

We saw two moving videos during the weekend. "Mother Wove the Morning" is a one-woman play written and performed by Carol Lynn Pearson on the lives of 16 women from history. The other video was on the Clothesline Project, part of a global movement to stop the cycle of violence against women. The "speaking" is done through

a clothesline of tee shirts on which women have written words to speak their experiences of having survived acts of violence and oppression.

Sunday morning Jennifer Justice from Wellfleet, MA, did a session on womanstory -- and again this was like nothing I had ever experienced. We spoke of times when we had found our voice, when we stepped into womanpower.

Later that morning (despite the fact that we had at least half a dozen UU churches and fellowships from which to choose -- imagine!), most of us went to the Arlington Street Church to hear Kim Crawford Harvie preach on simplifying your life (another moment that would make almost every UU woman feel proud by association).

Before we left our Boston gathering, Susan did the closing worship service -and provided the perfect icing to the cake. Which is why they asked her to do it, I'm sure.

Oh yes, and since we were there over Halloween, I might add that at night on October 31 we put cookies outside the front door for the ancestors. Nice touch! Definitely my kind of people.





# What Are Those Women Doing?

From all parts of Florida we came to UU In The Pines on a fair weather weekend last October. Our circles of women continue to spiral. The St. Pete Cakes Circle led by Emily Williams came together in "Woman-community" this past fall to "honor seven sisters entering their crone years": Gwen Donner, Barbara Fredericksen, Maurea Sleesman, Rose Marie Glasser, Gloria Goldstein, Mary-Corrine Johnston and Gloria Marvin. Alison Bolton participated as maiden. The Seminole Circle has completed testing "Rise Up and Call Her Name" and now are beginning Kay Hagen's "Prayers to the Moon" writing journey.

Connie Goodbread, Clearwater, has developed and is fieldtesting a curriculum through which pre-teen girls learn about goddesses through mythology and journaling. The next step is for women in the church to become their wisewoman mentors. At the end of the church school year, the girls will be presented to the congregation.

Diana Fraser and Emily Williams are leading "Cakes" Circles, and Karen Frank plans to lead one in April. Diane Anderson helped to start a Women's Lodge, divided into four circles named for the seasons. These circles come together once a month for ceremonies. Paula Stalley is leading a St. Pete Circle in study of the history of UU women. The Women's Guild at Tarpon Springs meets monthly. They recently raised money for the Clara Barton Camp for Diabetics in Mass.

Emily Williams and Patty Callaghan plan to start Womanspirit worship services the third Sunday of each month at 5:00 p.m. at St. Pete Church, starting Feb. 21. Seeing is believing. Believing is seeing. Blessed be!



## A Word About Our Special Guest -- Cynthia Grant Tucker

Cynthia Grant Tucker is a Professor of English at Memphis State University, having earned her Ph.D. in Comparative Literature during the late 1960's. Since then she has focused her teaching on women's creative struggles and writings and has snatched from obscurity whispered stories of unknown but representative sisters. In addition to Prophetic Sisterhood: Liberal Women Ministers of the Frontier, 1880-1930, she is the author of A Women's Ministry: Mary Collson's Search for Reform and Kate Freeman Clark: A Painter Rediscovered. Selected by the UU Women's Federation in 1989 for a Feminist Theology Award, Cynthia Tucker's current research examines how well liberal women have served or been served by the concept of churches as homes. A member of the Church of the Larger Fellowship, she and her husband have two children, Hope, 18, and Grant, 13.


Seventeen eager moondodgers circled the cauldron Of food processor gazpacho.

#### Book Review

OUTERCOURSE: The Be-Dazzling Voyage, by Mary Daly

First of all let me say loud and clear: this is readable! This is Mary's own story -- which is not a simple matter, but allows her to be accessible. It is an amazing story of a woman clearly on the cutting edge of this century's thought. It is the story of a woman philosopher (can you name many?). It is the story of a woman so out-rage-ous that the System doesn't really know what to do with her.

Mary Daly was recently in St. Petersburg, and having the honor of being in the presence of a great foremother of Feminism peaked my curiosity.

Her journey took me on a ride through a life I would never have access to in any other way. She speaks from the Fourth Spiral Galaxy – or the Other Side of the Moon. Like the cow who jumped over the moon, Mary Daly has been driven to Extreme Acts. We see just one side of the moon, but we know that the other side is there. It is an unseen fact. Just as much of our knowledge, our subliminal knowledge, is unseen, un"verifiable" fact. And so, with the other women of the past/present/future, Mary resides in the Expanding Now. She points to the door through which any of us may enter this Be-Dazzling Now. Without her, I'm afraid I wouldn't have even noticed the door. And it would have been my loss.



## The Stories of Our Lives

A Retreat for 10 Women with Barbara Child

to share the experience of exploring our spiritual autobiography

April 30--May 2, 1993 Cedar Lodge at The Pines



I invite 10 women to join me on this retreat, sponsored by the Florida District Women and Religion Committee, as a quest for a greater understanding of our lives by writing about them. We will not concern ourselves with writing skill or aptitude. The qualifications for participating are a willingness to write about and share your experience with the group and to respect and learn from the experience of others in a women's community of memory.

#### Cost and Schedule:

The cost is \$70 (\$60 for members of the Pines). The cost covers the retreat, including lodging, materials, and meals Fri. supper through Sun. breakfast. The retreat begins with supper at 7:00 Fri. It ends Sun. at noon.

#### Accommodations:

We will stay at Cedar Lodge, and vegetarian meals will be served to us there. (Another group will be meeting in the main bldgs.) Pillow and blankets are provided. Please bring sheets and towels.

#### Registration:


